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Ron Zimprich as Agriculturist of the Year

Mr. Ron Zimprich was selected by the North Dakota State University Saddle and Sirloin Club as the Agriculturist of the Year for the 90th Little International. Since 1924, deserving individuals that live a dedicated life to the agriculture industry in the state of North Dakota have been selected for this prestigious honor.

Ron was born and raised on a diversified farm near Cooperstown, North Dakota. They raised a variety of crops along with dairy cattle, beef cattle, and swine. Ron graduated from Cooperstown High



School in 1965. Soon after, he enrolled in classes at North Dakota State University majoring in Animal Science. He graduated from NDSU in the spring of 1969 and worked on a graduate degree for two years before accepting the position as Swine Barn Manager at the NDSU Swine Unit in June of 1971. In June of 1972, he married his wife Cheryl. They went on to have two sons and one daughter: Brian, Kari, and Craig.

For over four decades Ron has dedicated his life to the hog industry. He has been very active in the lives of youth who want to know more about the swine industry whether it was being the superintendent for the swine show at the Red River Valley Fair or the leader of the Prosper Livestock Club for 10 years. Ron has sold many hogs to interested kids that have been used as 4-H and FFA projects. Through Ron's work, he has sold and delivered market and breeding hogs to multiple livestock judging contests around the state and acted as an official judge for the past 40 years. Besides managing the NDSU Swine Unit, he has been a member of the North Dakota Pork Producers for 45 years and served 20 of those years on the North Dakota Pork Producers Council. On the council, he has served as both president and secretary.

Dairy Judging

The 2015 NDSU Dairy Judging Team had a great year of competition. The teams competed in five contests this year. Team members included Marissa Leier of Hague, ND, Carlie Krueger of Caledonia, MN, Bailey Dockter of Medina, ND, David Leier of Napoleon, ND, MarJenna McWilliam of Winger, MN, Jeff Neil of Pine Island, MN, Alex Fellbaum of Swanville, MN, and Cheyenne Dockter of Medina, ND. Coaches included Todd Molden and graduate student Mary Rodenhuis.

Starting off the year in January, Marissa, Carlie, Bailey, and David traveled to the Southwest Dairy Cattle Judging Contest in Fort Worth, Texas where Carlie placed 18th overall. After the new school year started, Marissa, Carlie, MarJenna, and Jeff went East to the All-American Dairy Judging Contest in Harrisburg, PA. For the next trip, MarJenna, Cheyenne, Alex, and Jeff went to Viroqua, WI for the Accelerated Genetics Judging Contest. While there, Alex placed 5th in Milking Shorthorns. A few short weeks later, Marissa, Carlie, MarJenna and Jeff headed to the Lely National Intercollegiate Dairy Cattle Judging Contest held in Madison, WI in conjunction with the World Dairy Expo. As a team, they tied for 1st in Milking Shorthorns and placed 2nd in Jerseys. In addition, Marissa placed 4th in Jerseys. After a short break, MarJenna, Cheyenne, Alex, and Jeff made the trek to the Louisville, KY for the North American International Livestock Exposition Dairy Judging Contest. The team represented well placing 9th with Jeff placing 4th in Ayrshires and 16th overall individually. In addition the team placed 2nd in Brown Swiss, 6th in Guernsey, and 8th in Holsteins.

The team progressed tremendously throughout the year. Each contest was filled with great competition and excellent dairy cattle, and the team members are thankful for the opportunity to travel the American countryside and make many new friends and memories.

On April 9th and 10th The NDSU meat judging team competed in the 2015 Southeastern contest, which was held by the Ohio State University and the University of Kentucky. Fourteen teams participated in this competition. The team received many honors including 3rd overall, 2nd in specifications, 5th in beef grading, 3rd in beef judging, 4th in lamb judging, 3rd in overall beef, 2nd in pork judging, 3rd in total placings, and 2nd in total reasons. The team also took home many individual accomplishments: Jaden Carlson: 8th overall, 5th in specifications, 6th in lamb judging, 3rd in pork judging, 9th in total placing, and 3rd in reasons; Leah Hawkins: 10th overall, 9th in specifications, 5th in beef grading, 6th in overall beef, and 4th in reasons; Hannah Nordby: 11th overall, 10th in lamb judging and 11th in reasons; Brittany Olson: 4th in pork judging.

On October 3rd, at the AMSA Eastern National Contest, the team was 9th out of 16 teams, 6th in lamb and veal judging, 3rd in pork, and 8th in total placing. Jaden Carlson was 13th overall, 7th in beef grading, 1st in lamb and veal judging, and 5th in pork judging. Cora Huss was 13th in pork judging. Brittany Olson was 8th in lamb and veal judging, and 3rd in total placings.

On October 18th, the North Dakota State University Meat Judging team traveled to Omaha, Nebraska for the American Royal meat judging contest, and was 11th overall out of 14 teams, 6th in total placings, Jaden Carlson was 6th in beef judging, and 7th in total placings, Cora Huss was 7th in lamb judging, and 11th in total placings.

On November 1st, the North Dakota State University meat Judging team traveled to Friona, Texas for the Cargill high plains meat judging contest, where the team was 10th overall, 7th in beef judging, 5th in pork judging, and 1st in total placings, Jaden Carlson was 19th in beef grading, 13th in overall beef, 19th in pork judging, 20th in specifications, 17th in total placings, 15th overall, Brittany Olson was 17th in beef judging, 10th in total placings, 27th in pork judging and Hannah Nordby was 15th in total placings, 22nd in overall beef, Cora Huss was 28th in pork judging, and 21st in total placings.

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On November 15th, The 2015 NDSU Meat Judging team competed in their last contest of the year at the international in Dakota City, Nebraska. The team was 12th overall, 9th in beef judging, 11th in lamb judging, 11th in overall beef, 10th in specifications, 7th in placing, and 11th in reasons. Jaden Carlson was 26th overall, 16th in beef judging, 12th in lamb judging, tied for 1st in specifications, but received 24th, 16th in total placing, and 26th in reasons. Hannah Nordby was 14th in total placing, and the winner of the Rachel Hamilton spirit award winner. Brittany Olson was also tied for 1st in specifications, but received 28th, and Cora Huss was 27th in placing. There were a total of 17 teams consisting of 66 individuals, and 46 alternates.

Description

Meat judging is a great opportunity for undergraduate students to not only travel around the country and see other universities meat labs, but also to network with industry professionals, and also with students and professors from other

universities. Judging also increases certain skills that are transferrable to many different areas of interest, including written communication, time management, decision making skills, and may also help improve your resume.

Livestock Judging Team

The 2015 North Dakota State University livestock judging team wrapped up another great year in November at the North American International Livestock Exposition. The 2015 team included Ashley Giedd, Washburn, ND, Quinn Steffan, Belfield, ND, and Daven Dockter, Medina, ND. The team started the fall at the National Barrow Show in Austin, MN. The team was the high team in the hog college contest. The team competed at the AKSARBEN livestock show, where they finished in the top ten. The team then traveled to the American Royal. The year came to a bitter sweet end at the NAILE, where Ashley Giedd finished in the top ten in Sheep. Ashley and Quinn will graduate in the spring of 2016 with a degree in Animal Sciences, and Daven will graduate with the same degree in the winter of 2016. The 2016 NDSU livestock judging team has already began to prepare for the upcoming year and will kick things off at the National Western in Denver, CO this coming January.
